Welcome to the Lancaster Arts theme of Land in 2025, celebrated by our cover image, marking our year-long commission called Are You Lost? as part of a new national initiative with the National Landscapes Association.

We are very excited by the international breadth in this season, bringing artists from China, New Zealand, Spain, France, Palestine, Finland and Estonia to the Great Hall, Nuffield Theatre and the Peter Scott Gallery.

Our concert season is full of debuts for Lancaster! Catch award-winning baritone Benson Wilson singing a bespoke programme called **Somewhere and Anywhere** with pianist Chris White and **Gao Hong** and **Ignacio Lusardi** exploring the infinite possibilities of the Chinese pipa and the flamenco guitar. And you won't want to miss the **Royal Philharmonic Concert Orchestra** playing exquisite 20th century works, many rarely heard in the U.K. The final concert of the season is with the renowned **VOCES8 Scholars Ensemble** in the Priory.

The gallery will be asking for your contributions to ideas of land with provocations from different artists and in March, we will build a human-sized nest with **Henna Asikainen**, inspired by birds rebuilding their homes and exploring experiences of displacement and belonging.

The Nuffield season will host two contemporary circus shows with Heka and (le) Pain, welcoming back Gandini Juggling and JD Broussé. We are delighted to welcome for the first time, Reece Williams with his acclaimed theatre show, This Kind of Black and David Labi with Pieces of a Man in a week that explores perspectives of fatherhood. We are offering

a rare opportunity to experience theatre in Lancaster University's unique Jack Hylton Room, for a story about the most significant campus protest in a generation with **Lessons on Revolution**.

It is fantastic to be presenting many shows in partnership this season, each a presentation we could not do on our own. The Confucius Institute will support the post-concert discussion on cross cultural exchange, Lancaster's LitFest will co-present a very special event with Palestinian writer **Raja Shehadeh** and More Music will support the first concert of the season with the amazing Estonian singer, **Mari Kalkun**. A feast of art and ideas for our theme of Land.

Nature Calling: Are You Lost?

Throughout 2024-2025 Various locations across Lancashire and the Forest of Bowland Price: Free Lancaster Arts is one of six producers across the country to be part of a National Landscape Association programme called Nature Calling. Lancaster Arts will be working with the Forest of Bowland National Landscape, alongside Bowland-bred and Lancaster-based artist, Rob St. John, on his project Are You Lost?, while Manchester-based writer, artist and rapper OneDa, is working with young people at Blaze Arts in Burnley and creating a spoken word piece.

Are You Lost? will create a series of film, sound and textile installations across Bowland which highlight the diverse voices and perspectives of the communities that live around and within the area. These temporary installations will be in accessible public spaces and in more remote, largely-unused spaces.

You can help shape the work through a series of public events, creative workshops and activities throughout this winter. We want to hear new voices on what land, access and community means in Bowland, both now and in the future.



Lancaster Arts welcomes, for the first time, Estonian folk artist Mari Kalkun, a voice that speaks to us from the heart of the Estonian forest. Her music is of a place and also, deeply personal, an intimacy, born of Baltic winter forests and icy landscapes and yet there is renewal, hope and celebration to be heard.

Mari's music has a timeless quality and unhurried sense of time and space. Rooted in ancient Estonian and Võru traditions, and played on a variety of instruments including kannel, piano and dronegas, her music resonates deep within us. Mari Kalkun takes old stories into a new, maybe even unexpected, context. "The motivation for this album is my own curiosity to turn back to a very old layer of tradition and find out what my ancestors have thought and sang and how it will resonate in the era of skyscrapers, steel and metal".

In summer 2023, Mari released her new album Stories of Stonia (Real World Records), co-produced with Sam Lee. Mari has taken the album across the globe and reached number one in the Transglobal World Music Chart and shortlisted for the Songlines Best New Albums.

Juggling and magic are long lost sisters. Heka (the Egyptian goddess of magic) transports audiences into a mesmerising realm, where reality blurs with illusion. It invites us on a journey where objects materialise and vanish, levitate, and transform before our eyes. Yet, beneath the surface lies a tantalising question: what is real and what is merely a trick of perception?

Heka challenges the gender stereotypes that have long persisted in the field of magic and positions women at the core of creation, no longer accessories but powerful artists who defy expectations and captivate audiences with their skill and stage presence.

Formed in 1992 by world-renowned jugglers Sean Gandini and Kati Ylä- Hokkala, Gandini Juggling continues to be at the vanguard of contemporary circus, reinventing and reinvigorating juggling for the 21st Century.

Lancaster Arts offers a rare opportunity to experience theatre in Lancaster University's unique Jack Hylton Room, as Samuel Rees and Gabriele Uboldi present Lessons on a Revolution, a story about change, how it happens, and how we talk about it. Lessons on Revolution brings the most significant protest of a generation to life through the voices of those who lived it.

1968, London School of Economics. Three thousand students occupy a lecture hall, demanding the university cut ties with apartheid-era Rhodesia. Tensions escalate as the students fight for radical change while the administration pushes back. The world watches, waiting to see who will blink first.

2024, two friends and flatmates try to work out what radical change means today, searching through archives, photos, firsthand accounts.

Gabriele Uboldi is a multidisciplinary artist and producer making work about cities, queerness, and storytelling. They head award-winning company Undone Theatre.

Samuel Rees is co-artistic director of Carmen Collective, His work has been performed in venues across the country to critical acclaim.

We are excited to welcome poet and musician Reece Williams for the first time with a powerful new show exploring the intersection between race and class.

(Requiem for Black Boys)

Reece Williams:

This Kind of Black

This Kind of Black (Requiem for Black Boys) is about growing up in Manchester's Moss Side in the 1990s, a stone's throw from conflict and violence. It celebrates a community held together by prayers, warmth and humour, while mourning the tragic loss of young life, when the media only portrays you through the lens of 'Gunchester,' gangs and poverty.

Above all the show explores the complex relationship between a gangland father and his son, and the impact of trauma on the mental health of young Black boys across the generations.

Reece Williams is a towering presence on the northern spoken word and poetry scene and has performed alongside the likes of Saul Williams, Kae Tempest, The Last Poets and Amiri Baraka. He is passionate about youth engagement, cultural policy and race relations and works to empower young people from economically deprived communities to create projects that foster social change.

A unique evening awaits you with opera singer, Benson Wilson and pianist Chris White who have created a bespoke musical response to the ideas of 'somewhere' and 'anywhere', performing for the first time together.

Award-winning New Zealand-born Samoan baritone Benson Wilson is one of today's most promising baritones. Audiences may remember Chris White's remarkable concert in spring 2022 where he transposed Mahler's Tenth Symphony for solo piano.

The programme responds to very different places – the national dances of Poland, Austria and Hungary, the songs of a German miller, and the songs of Samoa and New Zealand. But also, the music of journeys - Liszt's Pilgrimage Years, the Songs of Travel by Vaughan-Williams, and Mahler's Songs of a Wayfarer. Together, this special concert explores our relationships to the places in which we live our lives.

Chris White is Head of Opera at the Royal Academy of Music. Benson Wilson was the winner of the 64th Kathleen Ferrier Award and has worked with the English National Opera, Glyndebourne and Welsh National Opera amongst many others. In 2024, Benson has been touring extensively in New Zealand and recently performed Mozart's Requiem at the Bristol Beacon.

David Labi will be taking part in our A Conversation about Masculinity and Fatherhood event on Saturday 1 March at Lancaster Library, 2pm. We welcome David Labi to Lancaster Arts for the first time as he takes us on a hilarious and transformational journey based on the life of his father.

David's father was a Libyan Jew who survived the Nazi concentration camps as a child. Larger than life, he went on through business boom and bust, casinos and shady deals, a bomb attack, and more – hauling his loved ones on his wild rollercoaster of a life. Now David's having a midlife crisis. He longs to grow up, but his macho dad keeps getting in the way. In Pieces of a Man, we follow David on his search to find his dead father, and live on.

David is a writer and comic performer, who has shown work at Glastonbury and Edinburgh Fringe. He has performed Pieces of a Man in Berlin's legendary Volksbühne, many London venues and a sold out run at Belgium's top theatre festival, YAZ, Ostend. He currently runs his ethical storytelling agency Good Point in Brussels.

The Royal Philharmonic Concert Orchestra makes its debut at the Great Hall with an evening of sumptuous string music, rarely performed in the U.K.

Opening with George Walker's Lyric for Strings, discover a composer who was the first African-American composer to win a Pulitzer Prize for Music. This work has been performed only four times in the UK. This evening will also include a rare performance of Grażyna Bacewicz's Sinfonietta for String Orchestra, one of the greatest Polish composers of the twentieth century. The programme will also include the world premiere of the string orchestra version of lan Venables' Portrait of Janis.

In addition to these more rarely played works, are Sibelius' Impromptu and Grieg's invitation to dance in his Baroque-inspired Holberg Suite, while Britten's Simple Symphony invokes the comfort of childhood memories, filled with a nostalgia that is echoed in Ian Venables' tender Portrait of Janis.

The Royal Philharmonic Concert Orchestra is a dynamic and versatile ensemble that performs across the UK and around the world. Alongside being the classical music programmer for Lancaster Arts, Michael Poll has performed and recorded three times with the Royal Philharmonic, including premieres of new works. This is his conducting debut with the Concert Orchestra.

A Musical Exchange will bring together the ethereal elegance of the Chinese pipa and the fiery passion of the flamenco guitar in an extraordinary fusion of traditions, showcasing their shared virtuosity and capacity for profound emotional resonance.

Chinese pipa virtuoso Gao Hong and flamenco guitarist Ignacio Lusardi Monteverde have been touring their award-winning debut album, Alondra throughout the U.S. and China in 2024. Many of the selections this evening will come from this recording, where the musicians travel from ancient Asian dynasties, through the Thar desert to Andalusia, harmoniously combining cultures as the East meets West. Lancaster audiences may remember our online concert during the covid pandemic that took place in India with Ignacio and his brother, Santiago.

Henna Asikainen: Lintukoto/Haven

Season Celebration Thursday 1 May, 5.30pm Peter Scott Gallery Lintukoto is an idea from Finnish mythology: a warm, safe haven located at the far edge of the world where sky and earth meet. A paradise-like, mythical place where birds migrate to spend the cold winter season.

How does it feel to move across borders and boundaries? What does it take to belong in a new land? Can the natural world offer us different ways of thinking about our human existence? This exhibition explores experiences of displacement and belonging through an installation that combines sculpture, sound and natural materials. Henna's own experience of migration and family heritage of displacement comes together with her conversations with people seeking sanctuary, inviting empathy and reflection.

Inspired by birds rebuilding their homes in new places with materials available locally, Henna invites you to be part of building a human-size nest as a space of belonging within the gallery. Join us on Saturday 22 March to help create the nest. The exhibition will also be a space to share stories of movement, migration, and making home in a new place – come and share yours, however long or short the distance travelled.

We are honoured to welcome leading Palestinian writer Raja Shehadeh, acclaimed author of Palestinian Walks and coauthor Penny Johnson in collaboration with Lancaster Litfest.

When Raja Shehadeh first started hill walking in Palestine, in the late 1970s, he was not aware that he was travelling through a vanishing landscape. He will talk about his life, his work as a human rights lawyer, his love of walking and his many acclaimed books, including Palestinian Walks that have led to him being called 'a defiantly free spirit: a Palestinian Montaigne' (Adam Shatz, LRB).

In the second half Raja will be joined by his wife and co-author Penny Johnson to discuss their new book Forgotten: Searching for Palestine's Hidden Places and Lost Memorials: a profound meditation on memory and what we choose to memorialise.

This evening will be a celebration of Raja's life's work and will include images, video and film footage of the Palestinian landscape through which he has walked all his life. In a year in which we explore the theme of Land, tonight could not be more relevant.

JD will not follow his father, or his father's father or his father's grandfather into the family bakery. The boulangerie story has ended. (le) Pain is about breadmaking, physical heroics, growing up gueer in a boulangerie in the south of France, endings and new beginnings. It involves circus, dance, storytelling, Béarnaise folklore video, karaoke and laughter.

JD's artistry blends clowning, storytelling, physical theatre, cabaret, dance and performance. He has worked with Square Peg, Barely Methodical Troupe and Ellie Dubois and he co-created Knot with Nikki which won many awards and international acclaim. JD is not going to bake cakes. Or Bread. The family bakery has been sold.

Rob's practice is focused on the blurring of nature and culture in contemporary landscapes. He works primarily across installation, sound, moving image and text, usually based on slow periods of fieldwork and socially-engaged practice. He is currently developing Are You Lost?, a commission with Lancaster Arts and the Forest of Bowland National Landscape.

Henna Asikainen 18 March In person

Henna's artwork is concerned with humans' entangled relationship with the natural world and with movement, climate change, heritage and belonging. She works with installation, sculpture, video, sound, textile, and temporary interventions in landscapes. She was part of Lancaster Arts' LANDING in 2024 and her exhibition Lintukoto/ Haven opens in the Peter Scott Gallery in March.


Driving?

Use the LA1 4YW postcode with your Sat Nav. Exit the M6 motorway at junction 33 and take the A6 north towards Lancaster. Turn right at the third set of traffic lights on the A6 onto the University main drive. Take the first exit left from the roundabout, at the top of the hill, and park in Visitor Zone A.

Visitor Parking is free in any zone on campus after 6pm and all day during the weekends. The nearest visitor parking zone is 'A'. For weekday parking use the pay and display machines or purchase a parking scratchcard at the Reception lodge.

Buses run every 5 – 20 minutes from the city centre to campus. For timetables contact Stagecoach or call 'Traveline' on 0871 200 22 33.
